- Master in English or Four Years Bachelor Degree in English with minimum 45% marks from HEC recognized institute or equivalent.
- GAT-General Test (at least 50% score). This must be passed before the date of admission in the MPhil Program.
- Pass marks for the admission test should be at least 60%.
- Candidates will appear for an interview for the purpose of final selection.
